Price and boardcash

The board price of the voyage is the rent for ship and crew, which must be paid up front to Offshore Yacht Charter. The Board cash is the contribution for food and drinks on board (also for the crew) and for fuel, water, electricity and tourist tax etc. These expenses must be paid in cash to the skipper upon boarding. The contribution left over will be divided evenly amongst the guests at the end of the trip. If there are less than 3 participants, the cash box is usually not sufficient. In that case there will be charged a maximum of \in 50, - per person If you like the security of a private cabin, you can reserve this for 1.6 times the boardprice.

Boarding

Boarding is at 18:30 o'clock local time - Disembarkation at 10:30 o'clock (pm). After boarding the cabins will be divided. After dinner there will be an explanation about the ship and the safety of the ship and crew. It is <u>not</u> possible to board earlier, because of cleaning and provisioning the ship. You can try to leave your luggage at the harbour office, or wait in a pub.

Transfers

Transportation to and from the ship is not included and has to be arranged by the guests themselves. You can find more detailed information for the various ports under 'transfer information' on our website www.offshore-yacht-charter.com.

Discount (bordprice)

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Sailing holidays Z01-24: Passage & sailtraining -> Scotland (450M) Category E/A

We will set sail from the city center of Rotterdam off to Scheveningen. A laid-back start of the trip, with a cup of coffee we can enjoy sailing under 4 bridges including the iconic Erasmus Bridge. It is impressive to see Rotterdam from the water with all the busy shipping traffic. The 'New Waterway' is divided into mariphone block channels to guide shipping, an interesting aspect of this sail-training. Depending on the current, it is about three hours sailing to the North Sea, which gives us plenty of time to go through everything on deck.

In the evening we will make a route plan depending on the weather reports, a challenging puzzle. We will also study the weather charts. Our first plan will be to sail over to Whitby (U.K.), but Whitby is not an all weather access port and entering 24 hours a day is also not possible because of a sand bar. The route itself is crowded with shipping traffic routes, fishing vessels wind farms and oil rigs. An educational crossing where we will sail through the night in a watch system. An excellent exercise for studying the almanac and currents, practice with light recognition, radar & AIS, making bearings to prevent collisions and night sailing.

Whitby is a very beautiful and charming old fishing port. If the weather cooperates we will have some time left to recover and enjoy the cozy English atmosphere and sights.

After a night of rest, we sail further along the English coast up to Scotland. The wind determines the destination, but if it works out, we can make a stopover in, for example, Eyemouth or the charming Stonehaven. Again, active sailing in a watch system and we will have to keep a sharp lookout for shipping, fishing and wind farms.

This sail-training ends in Peterhead. A working harbour full of supply vessels for the oil rigs. We will end the trip in a pub, for a meal and a beer.

In short, an instructive sail training because of the busy shipping routes, strong currents and tidal puzzles, but above all a beautiful sailing voyage along a beautiful coast with nice harbours.

Sailing holidays Z13-24: sailtraining: Scotland -> Holland (400M)

Category A/E

From Edinburgh, we will sail across the North Sea to Rotterdam. Weather and tide will ultimately determine our route, but the plan is to do this in manageable legs. In the evening, we'll make a navigation plan depending on the weather reports, a hefty but instructive puzzle. We will also master how to interpret weather charts.

On the first day, we will generally not sail through the night to allow everyone to get used to the ship first, but that also depends on whether we can find a sheltered anchorage. If the weather and tide cooperate, we can sail to the pretty small town of Whitby next. We will remain there for a day to explore the village and its surroundings, and to prepare for a long leg to the Netherlands.

A distance of 230 miles with shipping lanes, oil rigs and lots of shipping traffic. An educational crossing with two nights of sailing during which we will use radar and AIS to avoid collisions, but will also practice with recognizing ship navigation lights.

We will sail with a 3-watch system, 3 hours on and 6 hours off. In this way, you'll get your rest, and it allows you to run a proper watch, also in colder conditions.

In short, an instructive high sea sail training due to the busy shipping lanes, strong currents and tidal calculations, but above all a beautiful sailing voyage along the scenic Scottish coast with lovely harbours.

The approach to Rotterdam is impressive with all the shipping, especially in the dark. The Nieuwe Waterweg is divided into VHF block channels to guide the shipping, a useful learning aspect to this sail training. The final leg through the city centre is very pretty with Rotterdam's beautiful new skyline and we will also sail under the Erasmus Bridge to our home port, where we will conclude this voyage and our season in a cosy restaurant.

The sailing distances are between 18 and 230 miles. The above schedule is subject to weather, wind and tide.
